



# MEDICARE-FOR-ALL

## Healthcare is a human right.

Everyone's life and freedom depends on having access to quality healthcare, regardless of a person's ability to pay. The most efficient and effective way to guarantee this right is to expand and enhance our existing Medicare program to all Americans.

Health is a life-and-death issue, not a commodity to be rationed based on one's financial situation.

You are not truly free if you have a serious illness or accident and cannot afford the treatment because private insurance premiums and out-of-pocket costs (deductibles, co-pays, etc.) are too high.

You are not truly free if you have to sell your home or go bankrupt to keep a family member alive.

When greedy, for-profit insurance middlemen deny you care in order to maximize return for their shareholders and CEOs, they deny you life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

They also interfere in the doctor-patient relationship.




Thanks to ACA protections and tax credits, Megan (a cancer survivor) has insurance, but the premiums, deductibles and co-pays are still too high. She hopes to make it to Medicare in five years.



- Universal: Extends Medicare the federal insurance program that currently covers seniors and the disabled to every person living in America. Gets young and healthy into the same risk pool as older and sicker.
- **Comprehensive:** Enhances existing Medicare to include not only inpatient, outpatient, ER, Rx, mental and rehab, but also dental, vision, hearing, chiropractic, podiatry, medical devices, prenatal and longterm care.
- Simple & Cost-Effective: Say goodbye to the maze of predatory, for-profit insurance premiums, deductibles, co-pays and medical bills. Relieves families from the stress and destruction of medical debt.
- Freedom & Choice: Go to any doctor or hospital in the entire U.S. Coverage follows you when you move, change jobs, retire, etc.
- Good for Care Providers: Relieves hospitals, doctors and other care providers of the burden and expense of dealing with multiple bureaucracies for revenue.
- **Good for Business:** Gets the insurance burden and cost off the backs of businesses, making them more competitive in the global market. Frees entrepreneurs from job lock.
- Good for the Economy: Federal negotiating power and single, simplified administration reduce costs and rein in healthcare inflation.
- **Big Savings for 95% of Americans:** Modest employer-side payroll tax *replaces* all premiums and out-of-pocket costs. Average family **SAVES** nearly \$7,000/year!

A arowina number of Americans believe government must quarantee everyone has health coverage. An April 2017 Economist/YouGov poll found that 60% of all voters, includina 75% of Democrats, 58% of Independents, 46% of Republicans (and even 40% of Trump voters) support Medicare-For-All.



#### What WE say about OUR position:

No one who works full-time should live in poverty.
Minimum wage laws protect workers from exploitation by the greedy, powerful few. Plus, when workers have a little extra money, they spend it in the economy, creating more jobs.

#### What OPPONENTS say about THEIR position:

Let the free market set wages. Individual workers can negotiate their own wages based on merit, skill and hard work. If an employee wants higher wages, he/she should work harder and get more skills.

#### What OPPONENTS say about OUR position:

Minimum wage laws cause businesses to lay off low-skilled workers—especially teenagers seeking work experience—and replace them with robots. No way to calculate a fair minimum: If \$15/hr, why not \$100/hr?

#### What WE say about THEIR position:

How much someone gets paid often has more to do with power than hard work. Greedy corporations and bosses exploit desperate workers who have few options and little power to complain or negotiate.

## MINIMUM WAGE

## Freedom and justice require decent work at decent pay.

Reasonable minimum wage laws protect Americans by guaranteeing that everyone who works full-time will not live in poverty. The greedy, powerful few should not be allowed to exploit desperate workers.

#### How to Set a Reasonable Federal Min. Wage

Analogous to setting reasonable speed limits on our roads, we look at data across the country for what it costs for an average size family to afford a safe, modest rental home, healthcare, nutritious food, etc. and divide that by 40 hrs/week. A good ballpark is \$15/hr. States and cities can set theirs even higher.

## Arizona Increases Minimum Wage Starting 2017

Proposition 206 (the Fair Wages and Healthy Families Act), which was a ballot initiative approved by over 58% of Arizona voters in Nov 2016, gradually increases the minimum wage from \$8.05 in 2016 to \$12.00/hr by 2020 (it is \$10.00/hr in 2017). After 2020, it will automatically increase annually by cost of living.



#### "Why I'm on Strike Today: I Can't Support Myself on \$7.85 at Burger King"

By Willietta Dukes, The Guardian, August 29, 2013

Excerpts: "Before Burger King, I worked at Church's (Chicken) for 12 years, starting at \$6.30 and ending at just a little more than \$8 an hour... I've worked in fast-food for 15 years, and I can't even afford my own rent payments. We just want fairness and to be able to provide for our families... I know what it feels like to be truly afraid afraid of having your children go to bed hungry, or having your heat turned off in February, or being evicted from your home... Burger King says they can't pay employees like me higher wages because it would force them out of business. Yet last year it made \$117 million in profits and its CEO took home \$6.47 million."



## GET THE FACTS

- More than 90% of minimum wage workers are 20 years old or over.
   Average is 36 years. 28% are parents.
- If the federal minimum wage had kept up with inflation since peaking in 1968, it would be \$9.68/hr (instead of \$7.25). If it had kept pace with productivity, it would be nearly \$19.00. Instead, that extra income shifted to the Top 1%.
- Raising the minimum wage to \$15
   by 2024 would lift wages for 41 million
   Americans (= 29% of the workforce).
   40% of black workers and 34% of
   Hispanic workers would get a raise.

#### Low Wages Cost Taxpayers \$150 Billion/year in Corporate Welfare

Walmart employees must rely on food stamps and Medicaid to survive and work at the stingy retailer. That adds up to a federal subsidy of \$6.2 billion per year — averaging \$900,000 to \$1.75 million per store and \$4,400 per employee — enabling Walmart to boast a profit of \$16 Billion.

Unions and collective bargaining help balance the power between workers and management so they have a voice and seat at the table to negotiate good wages and benefits and safe workplaces.

## United we bargain. Divided we beg.

Due to the huge power imbalance between workers and corporate owners, the best way for workers to negotiate fair wages, good benefits and safe workplaces is by bargaining together as a group. Labor unions protect individual workers from exploitation.

"If CEOs have the right to negotiate multi-million dollar compensation packages, then working people have the right to negotiate together for fair wages and benefits."

"It's time to restore some balance between management and working people, starting with making sure working people have a voice and a seat at the table."

"Every time a CEO cuts himself a bonus check for \$25 million, he's cutting the paycheck of 25,000 workers by \$1,000 apiece. If that isn't un-American, I don't know what is."

#### **Unions: A Smart Investment**


Carl worked 40 years as a repairman for the phone company where he was also a member of Communication Workers of America (CWA) union. At the end of his career, he was earning \$29/hour (up to double that with overtime pay), had good health coverage for his family and five weeks paid vacation, plus sick days.

An impatient manager once ordered Carl and his co-workers to jump in an unsafe pit and start splicing cut cable. They knew the union would defend them if they waited for the hole to be shored up.

Carl retired with a modest pension of \$2,000/month to supplement his Social Security and 401k investments. And the union continues to fight to protect his retiree health benefits. The price of union membership — just two hours of pay per month and strike solidarity — was a smart investment for Carl and his family.



## As union membership drops, Top 1% takes larger slice of income pie (& vice-versa)



As union density dropped from 33% to 11%, middle class share of all income dropped from 53% to 45%.

## What Difference Does A Union Make? Union No Union

- **1.** Wages, benefits and working conditions are protected by a legal contract.
- **2.** A contract spells out how much each worker earns.
- **3.** Unions negotiate raises for everyone. Members vote on it, and if they feel it's unfair, they can vote it down.
- **4.** If you are unfairly disciplined, unions provide due process to protect against unscrupulous supervisors.
- **5.** If you don't like something at work, you can work together with your union to change it.

- **1.** Management can change wages, benefits and working conditions unilaterally, at whim.
- **2.** No one knows how much anyone else earns. Unfair treatment and favoritism exist.
- **3.** If you want a raise, you must plead your case to a supervisor or manager.
- **4.** As an at-will employee, if you are unfairly disciplined, you are on your own. You get no due process or representation.
- **5.** If you don't like something at work, you are at the mercy of management.



#### **Public investment** enables private success.


Decent private life and private enterprise depend upon robust public investment in infrastructure, security, education, health, research and economic stability — no one is "self-made." Privatization of vital resources is public theft to benefit the wealthy few.

#### What Belongs in the Public Sphere?

The basic necessities for a decent life and functioning society should be the domain of public investments and protection, not profit-seeking. Taxes are the dues we pay for a caring, modern, civilized country.

#### **Examples of Market Failures** & Profit's Perverse Incentives

- Private health insurers strive to deny care and sick people to boost profits.
- · For-profit prisons lobby for draconian drug and immigration laws to fill beds. Taxpayers must quarantee them revenue.
- To make lots of money, the military industrial complex perpetuates endless war and useless weapons (e.g. the \$400 Billion F-35 boondoggle).
- Private toll roads are inefficient and unfair, as well as unprofitable in rural and low-income areas.



• America is one of the LEAST taxed developed countries, making far less public investment than peer countries.

- **5.** Most of us don't expect to be rich or famous, but we do expect a living wage and good American benefits for a hard day's work.
- **6.** You can't have a vibrant economy without a vibrant middle class because someone's got to build things and someone's got to buy them.
- 7. When our elected officials are voting for or against a bill, they should be consulting their conscience and their constituents, not their campaign contributors.
- **8.** If working and middle class people are going to take a hit in tough times, it should not be to pay for tax breaks for millionaires and oil companies.
- 9. It's time we started increasing opportunity and stopped shrinking the middle class.

#### And if you make the right comparison, even red-state Republicans will understand what organized labor is all about...

- 1. If CEOs have the right to negotiate multi-million dollar compensation packages, then working people have the right to negotiate together for fair wages and benefits.
- 2. It's time to restore some balance between management and working people, starting with making sure working people have a voice and a seat at the table.
- **3.** Every time a CEO cuts himself a bonus check for \$25 million, he's cutting the paycheck of 25,000 workers by \$1,000 apiece. If that isn't un-American, I don't know what is.
- **4.** You don't build a middle class by cutting the pay and benefits of teachers, who are struggling like the rest of us, or by pitting working people against each other.
- 5. It used to be in good times, management and labor sat down at the table to figure out how to divide up the profits so everybody got their fair share. Now they want to throw out the table.
- **6.** Politicians who talk about "public employees" like they're lazy, overpaid, and scamming the system ought to look in the mirror.

#### Effective Messaging: Tell a Coherent Memorable Story

Connect with values, raise concerns, and end with hope. If it's emotionally inert, it's politically inert. If you don't feel it, don't use it. Create images in people's minds.

#### Sample Short Narrative: Speaking of the American Dream

The American Dream used to mean something... that if you put in a hard day's work, you could expect good American wages, benefits and a better life for your kids. It meant we were a middle class country with middle class values of hard work, opportunity and fairness. Now we're in danger of losing the middle class as big corporations, CEOs and their lobbyists are writing all the rules. It's time we stopped rewarding companies that ship our jobs overseas. It's time we stopped giving tax breaks to billionaires and big corporations when working Americans are struggling to make ends meet.

#### Sample Short Narrative: Speaking of Government

It's time politicians stopped running for or against government and started running it well. We need leaders who understand what happens when you let big business call all the shots. People who work full time should not be struggling to put food on the table or gas in their tanks. People who retire with a pension and benefits shouldn't find themselves with a handful of empty promises. True leaders don't sit back and hope things work out as big corporations outsource good American jobs to China, or double the price of gas. Leadership means knowing when to step back and when to step up to make sure the system works for people who work for a living.

#### Sample Short Narrative: Speaking of the Economic Collapse

The economic collapse was not caused by Americans borrowing too much. It was caused by decisions made by bankers who decided they were going to create fraudulent loans that had balloons in them buried in the fine print that you needed a PhD to figure out. They then repackaged those as toxic assets that they could pass off, and Standards & Poor's and Moody's would give an A+ rating. And then they said, "Hey don't worry about it, AIG's got us covered in case it fails." Well, that was a great house of cards. The economic collapse was caused by fancy speculative schemes on Wall Street.

#### **Conclusions**

- 1. It's time we recognize that what we progressives believe is what the average American believes.
- **2.** The way to move the center is not to move to the center. Instead, speak to the center about progressive American values.
- **3.** It's time we stopped accepting whatever the leaders on "our side" are willing to offer just because the other side sucks worse. Democrats saying "We're only half as corrupt as the other guys" doesn't exactly warm the cockles.
- **4.** Republicans' ideology fits well with being bought. They already believe rich people and powerful corporations ought to get all the wealth and privileges and write all the rules.
- **5.** Our biggest deficit in America isn't budgetary. It's a deficit of courage.

#### Paul Krugman, Nobel Prize Winning Economist 6/19/12

The "kitchen table/belt-tightening" metaphor is naturally appealing, but it doesn't work because "We are not a household; we are an economy. And an economy is a very different thing from an individual family because we are each others customers. Your spending is my income. And my spending is your income. And if we both try to get ourselves in better shape by spending less, all that happens is we end up reducing all our incomes." Keynesian economics is counterintuitive unless it is explained well.

#### Senator Sheldon Whitehouse 6/18/12

Pull-back-the-curtain metaphor for combating right-wing spin: "Very often a lot of these very nice sounding ideas are sort of stalking horse for things we don't so much like. They'll say we need to balance the budget. Yeah sure, we need to balance the budget. That sounds like it makes sense. Pull back the 'balance the budget' curtain, what's behind it? Get rid of Medicare. Nobody wants that, so they talk about balancing the budget. They talk about eliminating wasteful and obsolete regulation. Makes sense: If a regulation is wasteful and obsolete, we should get rid of it. Pull back the curtain — it's really about getting rid of the Clean Air Act. So you just gotta remind people what their real agenda is and push through that first level of spin."

#### Eric Schneiderman, New York Attorney General 6/19/12

Transformational Politics = Changing Consciousness: "Over the last 25 years, the conservatives did an amazing job of transformational politics. They essentially convinced the American people of something that they had stopped believing since the 1920s — that the natural order of things is for there to be a small number of people with all the money and most people don't have so much. Look at how they've changed the dialogue: When people talk about redistribution of wealth, they only mean taking it from the wealthy and giving it to working people or the poor. We've just seen 30 years of the most amazing redistribution of wealth from working people to the wealthy in history, but people don't call it that. They've reframed the debate. They've transformed the way people think."

"This (the economic collapse) is not something that happened because of some act of God. There's no missing page of Genesis that says there are separate tax breaks for capital gains and carried interest. This doesn't come from God. The day the American people understand that this is just a bunch of people who decided to have public policy to redistribute all of the wealth in society to a very small number of people... It's public policy, not Nature, not God. And we have the power to change it."

"When we're accused of class warfare, it's like a guy steals your wallet and when you ask for it back, he says 'Why are you so hung up on money? It's about money all the time'... No that's my wallet, and you have it. And basically that should be our message."

Our message is pretty simple: We are being lied to. We cannot solve big problems in this country, while we're being misled about the facts...

#### 1 Lie #1: America is broke.

We're broke, so maybe we can't afford Medicare. We're broke, so maybe we can't afford teachers to teach our children. We're broke, so maybe we need to lay off police officers, and firefighters, and nurses, and close hospitals, and take away heating assistance in the winter. Maybe we can't afford to fix roads, let the bridges fall down. Maybe we can't afford health care for poor people or the disabled. After all, we're broke, right?

Wrong... You know, repeating the falsehood that America is broke is like telling people stuck in a burning building that all the exits are locked when they aren't. Just repeating the statement, over and over again, makes people feel helpless... We do not have to suffer like this, America. Because we're not broke. We were robbed. And somebody has our money. And I mean: who has the money that used to be in our pockets, in our schools, in our retirement accounts?

If "we" are broke, how come only some of us are suffering, while others enjoy wealth beyond the wildest dreams of any previous generation?... The income of the rich has grown by almost 250% while the middle class is barely making 20% more than they did three decades ago.

But we keep hearing from certain people: "Well, if you're falling behind, you're just not working hard enough. You must be lazy. Why don't you try harder?" So we did. Just to keep up, we put in more hours. One paycheck was no longer enough, so both parents started working, we got second jobs, third jobs. Then we said, screw it, we maxed out our credit cards, I know you did; I did too! We used our houses as ATMS. Because we were trying to make up for this growing shortfall between what we were contributing to the economy as middle class and working class folks – and what the average employer was giving back to this country in the form of wages.

Then, the crash came. And today, our country is almost unrecognizable. There are some people, good people, you know them, who, no matter how hard they work, no matter how much they follow the rules, they cannot succeed anymore in America. And then there are other people, other folks, who, no matter how lazy they are, and no matter how many rules they break, are never allowed to fail. In fact, the media says they are "too BIG to fail."

#### 2 Lie #2: Asking the super-rich to pay taxes hurts America's economy.

Now. Pardon me. You would think that, since so many corporations refuse to share their earnings through wages, they might at least be patriotic enough to pay back America in the form of taxes. But no. They scream and howl. They say that asking the super-rich to pay taxes hurts America's economy. It would be a job killer!

Alright folks. Basic civics. Here we go: Corporate taxes are not charity, and they are not theft. Corporate taxes are a return on our investment, as Americans... American companies don't have to pay for the roads they use to ship their products out. Our tax money pays for those roads. America pays for those roads, so the businesses don't have to. That's a big expense that they don't carry on their books. That's an investment from us. They don't have to pay to set up their own court system, to enforce all those contracts, all that fine print. They don't have to create their own 911 emergency service. They don't pay to purify their own water or air. They don't have to teach anyone to tie their shoes, or to do algebra. Our tax money pays for public school teachers to do that work. America as a whole pays. We shoulder those big burdens so that America's businesses don't have to. Which means what our businesses do pay out in taxes, they more than get back in services, support and stability — all keys to making a profit...

When you do well in America, you should do well by America. It's only fair. It's a fair return on investment, after all, the American Dream is possible only when employers pay decent wages and fair taxes. But the problem is too many of our giant corporations don't want to do either...

But just because we'd all like to be rich some day, we can't just let the super-rich do whatever they want, like loot our nation's treasury and refuse to pay us a penny back...

See, our grandparents respected business people. But they didn't worship them. They didn't worship markets... Because they lived through the Great Depression. They knew what it was like to have the bottom completely drop out from underneath them. So in rebuilding America, the first thing they did was create the ideal conditions for a thriving middle class. There were three pillars.

**Pillar 1: Good government**, to help middle class people buy things together that we couldn't buy individually — like quality education for our kids, clean air and a safety net, some insurance against tough times. **Pillar 2: Good employers** – who, whether they wanted to or not, paid decent wages and fair taxes. **Pillar 3: Good citizens and community members**, actively involved in making our country stronger and more fair. Civil rights. Women's rights. Equal rights. And don't forget the unions. In 1945 more than a third of all American workers were union workers. Today? Just 13 percent. Look, whether you personally wanna be in a union or not — our grandparents respected unions, even when they didn't join them. **They knew that giving a voice to working folks was key to having an economy that could maximize profit without minimizing people...** 

So while they were building these pillars: they put protections in place, guard rails, so those bankers couldn't run their own train off the rails again — and run over America's working families in the process. They put rules in place and guardians at the door to keep the big bankers from turning Wall Street into a casino and gambling with America's future, ever again.

And page by page, we let them tear the wisdom, and the genius and the good sense of our grandparents and great-grandparents from our lawbooks... "Oh, we're just gonna deregulate this here, make a little mo money... privatize that there, make a little mo money... deregulate everything ...don't mind us." Just like the 1920s. Privatize the gain, socialize the pain. No rules for the rich. No rights for the poor. Socialism for the super-wealthy; Darwinism for the working people. Same as before... Same disaster... We voted in 2008 for peace and prosperity, not war and austerity.

### 3 Lie #3: Hating on America's government and wrecking America's infrastructure is patriotic.

The worst part of all of this, for me, is the way that the people championing the dismantling of the American Dream paint their efforts all "red, white and blue." They want to paint their wrecking ball "red, white and blue" and expect us to stand here saluting while they destroy the country... Of course, they always cleverly hide that fact. They say it, "Oh, we hate 'the government," or the "federal government." But Excuse me, sir. My dad served in the military. Last time I checked, the "federal" government was also known as "America's government." So how do you get to be a patriot, trashing America's government all the time?... That's some cheap patriotism if you ask me! The time has come for a deeper patriotism.

#### 4 Lie #4: The lie we tell ourselves: The lie that we are helpless.

The Pledge of Allegiance does not stop with the word "liberty." As Americans, we like to say the whole pledge: "liberty" yes! But "liberty and justice for all." Justice for all... My problem with the other brand of patriotism is not that it's too patriotic. It's that it's not patriotic enough. It doesn't embrace the full set of American values. Deep patriotism does. Cheap patriotism thinks that America is just our economic performance. Deep patriots say: Don't make America that small. We have achieved more than that in this country. We are remarkable because we've also achieved outstanding environmental performance, outstanding labor standards, outstanding consumer protections.

No, our nation is not broke and our fighting spirits cannot be broken... Let's stand together, work together and continue the fight: For liberty and justice for all.
